Program Year 2 CAPER Executive Summary response:

Williamson County was awarded \$1,216,521 of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to allocate to projects for FY10 (October 1, 2010 – September 30, 2011). Nine projects were funded in FY10, seven infrastructure projects and two social service projects. All are identified as a high priority in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan.

The Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) is required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to report on the annual performance of the Williamson County FY10 CDBG program. This report identifies the progress made regarding active projects and those projects that have been completed that received Williamson County funds, as well as other accomplishments the County has made in meeting the objectives and priorities outlined in the five year Consolidated Plan.

Accomplishments: Seventy-five connections have been accomplished and paid for to date to households that have been identified as income qualified. Income documentation is submitted to the Williamson County CDBG office for review and approval prior to CDBG payment. 2,148 LF of 8" gravity sewer line was installed in Park Meadow Drive, running south from FM 487. 3,023 LF of 12" gravity sewer line was installed parallel to IH-35 from 10th street north.

CDBG funds utilized: \$1,282,144.70

Progress: All construction on the Donahoe Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant is complete. All main lines in the downtown area are complete. Work is complete on the trunk main. Final household connections are being made.

Progress: First phase of the project has been completed and accepted by the City. The City has hired a new engineer for the following phases of the project. Additional phase has been bid and contract been awarded.

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Georgetown, Old Mill Village
FY04 \$95,000

Accomplishments: Five homes were completed in February 2007. Three homes were completed in December 2007. Additionally, one home was completed in May 2008, one home was completed in April 2008, two homes were completed in June 2008, two homes were completed in December 2008 and one home was completed in August 2009. In 2010, two homes were completed in June and one home was completed in November. The final two homes were completed in December 2010 and November 2011. All CDBG funds have been expended for the infrastructure for twenty homes. A \$100,000 (portion of value of donated land) has been associated with this project.

CDBG funds utilized: \$95,000

Progress: Twenty homes have been completed.

City of Georgetown, Leander and 22nd Street Improvements

Accomplishments: Project is complete. This project consists of improvements to the current pedestrian access along 22nd Street and drainage improvements from 21st Street to 22nd Street along Austin Avenue. A connection with the sidewalk at Railroad Avenue was made to then head east along 22nd Street to connect with the existing sidewalk. The sidewalk was constructed five feet in width and conforms to all current ADA standards including slope, width, handicap ramps and access. The length of the sidewalk project is approximately 300 linear feet. The drainage improvements were constructed along Austin Avenue between 21st and 22nd Street. The area between Austin Avenue and the property lines have been re-graded. Construction of an eight foot wide concrete valley gutter was constructed at the low point of the area and convey storm water to a connection with 22nd Street. The area between Austin Avenue and the property lines were re-graded and paved with asphalt to allow for positive drainage within the area and to 22nd Street. Standard curb and gutter and ribbon curb were placed with the project to enhance the drainage improvements.

CDBG funds utilized: \$478,479.21

Progress: Project is complete.

Williamson County Mobile Outreach Team, Social Service

Accomplishments: The team has assisted 88 new low income verified clients and 85 previously established low income clients between October 2010 and September 2011.

City of Georgetown, FM 1460

Accomplishments: Funds were utilized for the engineering, design and construction of approximately 1980 linear feet of a 6-foot wide sidewalk on the north side of FM 1460, running from Austin Avenue to Quail Valley Road in Georgetown, TX. Construction also included 6 ramps at road crossings, compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

CDBG funds utilized: \$91,879.13

Accomplishments: Project is complete. Environmental review was completed and funds released in July 2010. Rehabilitation of Elevated Tank located in Thrall, TX included rehabilitation of interior and exterior surfaces, replacement of roof hatch,

vent, interior ladder, safety climbs, cathodic removal/patch plates, flap valve replacement, and interior/obstruction lights. Removal and replacement of splash pad, re-grade overflow discharge to drain, erosion control and revegetation. Installation of permanent generator with concrete pad also included.

Progress: Project is complete.

City of Leander, Bagdad Road Sidewalk

FY10 \$100,000

Accomplishments: Project is complete. Construction of .26 mile - 6 foot wide sidewalk on the east side of Bagdad Road from north of Crystal Falls Parkway to Los Vista Drive in Leander, TX.

CDBG funds utilized: \$100,000

Progress: Project is complete.

United Seniors of Taylor, Sidewalk Project

FY10 \$20,000

Accomplishments: Project was completed on May 17, 2011. Reconstruction of approximately 300 square yards of sidewalk, including demolition and removal and 200 square yards of new concrete sidewalk installation at 410 W. 7th Street between the Taylor Senior Center and the Taylor Public Library.

CDBG funds utilized: \$13,026

Progress: Project is complete.

City of Jarrell, City Sewer Project

CDBG-R Funding: \$297,718

Accomplishments: Project is complete. The construction of the lift station, lift station site and force main is complete. Project is located in the southwest portions of Jarrell, TX. Boundaries include C. Bud Stockton Loop, FM 487 and IH35 and benefits existing households along CR309 and 306. A total of 6 full time equivalent jobs were retained.

CDBG-R funds utilized: \$296,776.41

Progress: Project is complete.

Changes in program as a result of experiences:

To improve the efficiency of the Williamson County CDBG program, the Grants Coordinator is continuously updating documents such as applications and income verification documents. The subrecipient binder that has been used by the Grants Coordinator has proven to be effective in assisting cities and organizations manage their projects. The CDBG office is also developing a program income policy, a match policy and a land acquisition agreement.

The County will attempt, whenever possible, to avoid paying up front costs in an effort to circumvent the potential of projects not coming to fruition and therefore expenditures becoming ineligible under CDBG regulations.

The current Analysis of Impediments identifies possible impediments to fair housing choice as:

- A lack of coordination of housing services in the County.
- Possible discrimination towards minority homebuyers and renters.
- Developers having little motivation to build affordable housing due to cost prohibitive barriers for construction.
- Preconceptions of minority borrowers regarding borrowing money.

The County has hired a consulting firm to conduct an Analysis of Impediments. On October 3 – 5, several meetings with stakeholders were conducted as well as pre-meeting questionnaires. Representatives from the following types of organizations were contacted regarding the Analysis:

- County Planning and Zoning Director
- County Building Codes Official
- Public Housing Authorities
- Affordable Housing Providers
- Advocacy Organizations for Persons with Disabilities
- Advocacy Organizations for Persons with LEP
- Williamson County Association of Realtors
- Public Transit Agency
- Local human rights organizations, legal aid agencies
- Social Service Organizations, Housing for Special Needs Populations
- Local Landlords Association

The complete document is expected to be completed in February or March 2012.

The Grants Coordinator works with local agencies in an effort to better coordinate services available to County citizens. The County supports programs that have anti-discrimination policies in place. The County also supports organizations such as Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County, the Round Rock Area Serving Center, the Capital Area Finance Corporation, the Caring Place and the Georgetown Housing Authority in order to combat possible impediments to fair housing. These organizations provide services such as affordable housing, assistance with transitional housing, provide financial assistance for utilities and rents, temporary housing, and down payment assistance.

Action taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs:

There have been 67 sewer connections made to identified income eligible households in Liberty Hill and 75 sewer connections in Jarrell. The Mobile Outreach Team has served 173 income eligible clients from October 2010 through September 2011. There have been 20 Habitat homes completed in the Old Mill Village neighborhood which utilized FY04 funding for the infrastructure of these home.

The County funded Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County for land acquisition. An agreement has been completed and will be presented to Commissioners Court for approval in December 2011. Lots will be purchased for affordable homes throughout the County.

Leveraging Resources:

City of Jarrell, Sewer Project: Total leverage amount of \$536,181 of City funds. The project has an additional leverage amount of \$1,520,000 issued from a grant through the Texas Water Development Board.

City of Liberty Hill, Sewer Project: Total leverage amount of \$850,805 from City funds.

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Georgetown, Old Mill Project: A leveraged amount of \$100,000 has been documented through a land donation provided to the organization for the 20 new homes. The program also acquired a SHOP grant in the amount of \$100,000 to be partially used for this project.

City of Georgetown, Leander and 22nd Street Improvements: Leverage amount of \$45,000 of City funds.

City of Georgetown, FM 1460: Leverage amount of \$15,000 of City funds.

City of Jarrell, Water Project: Leverage amount of \$13,000 of City funds.

City of Georgetown, Scenic Drive Project: Leverage amount of \$15,000 of City funds.

City of Taylor, Dickey Street Drainage Project: Leverage amount of \$122,500 of City funds.

City of Thrall, Water Well Rehab Project: Leverage amount of \$2432.50 of City funds.

Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County, Land Acquisition: Leverage amount has not been calculated at this time. CDBG funds to purchase lots only. Costs of building homes will be calculated as leveraged funds.

There are no matching requirements applied to CDBG funds. The County is reviewing a possible policy that would incorporate a matching policy as to better assist organizations or cities with projects.

Managing the Process

Program Year 2 CAPER Managing the Process response:

The Grants Coordinator has corresponded with representatives of each project to ensure compliance. Each project is required to submit monthly progress reports that are reviewed to certify that projects are progressing. These reports are also used in an effort to communicate any current obstacles or predict any future obstacles. These reports have proven to be very effective in ensuring that goals outlined in the Annual Action Plan are met.

Desk monitoring of all projects are conducted throughout the year as well as meetings held with project administrators as needed. A remote monitoring was conducted by the HUD San Antonio field office in September 2011. All questions raised received a response and action as needed. An audit was conducted by outside auditors in 2011.

The Grants Coordinator works closely with the Williamson County Auditors office in an effort to ensure appropriate and accurate financial documents are submitted for payment and that funds are spent in a timely manner. The Grants Coordinator and Grants Accountant work closely to improve procedures and to make certain that current procedures are efficient and adequate. All documents submitted with draw requests are thoroughly examined by the Grants Coordinator to ensure funding is being expended on eligible expenses and that funds are being utilized efficiently.

Program Year 2 CAPER Institutional Structure response:

The County continually works with organizations and cities to gain better knowledge of needs in the County. Collaborative projects are strongly encouraged as to promote and enhance coordination.

As previously stated, the County is in the process of completing an Analysis of Impediments.

Program Year 2 CAPER Monitoring response:

1. The Grants Coordinator uses monthly progress reports submitted by each project to identify any problems or potential problems. Contact with each project manager assists in ensuring that projects are progressing, following appropriate regulations and utilizing CDBG funds efficiently and effectively. The Grants Coordinator also conducts meetings and/or communicates via email and phone with project managers regarding specifics of projects.

The Grants Coordinator conducts desk monitorings of each project to ensure compliance and progression.

2. Meeting with representatives from the projects ensures that regulations are being followed. Review of income documents for the City of Libery Hill sewer project and the City of Jarrell sewer project has allowed for a thorough assessment of documents and the data included in those documents. Doing so has allowed for a concise pool of income eligible residents who received waste water connections.

All projects receive a subrecipient binder that entails HUD guidance, County forms, labor forms and Davis Bacon information, and information on how to access funds. The binder has proven to provide valuable guidance to subrecipients and is a good reference tool for both the subrecipients and the Grants Coordinator.

3a. The Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County Old Mill Village project has completed twenty homes. The City of Georgetown has utilized CDBG funds to install curbs and sidewalks in this same area. The Jarrell City Sewer System project will replace individual septic systems that could potentially cause health related issues in a low and moderate income area of town. Liberty Hill is also utilizing CDBG funds to improve the sewer system by replacing failing and non-operational septic systems with a city sewer system. The Mobile Outreach Team has used CDBG funds to increase the number of clients they serve.

3b. Nine projects were funded in FY10, seven infrastructure projects and two social service projects. All projects are identified as a high priority in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan.

3c. The County provides descent housing for its low-mod income residents through the use of its cities' housing authorities. The County supports the Capital Area Housing Finance Corporation on projects that provide assistance toward home ownership and/or rental assistance for low income households. The County supports Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County which provides affordable homes for local residents. This is being accomplished through Habitat for Humanity Old Mill project and the 2009 land acquisition project.

3d. Because the majority of Williamson County projects are infrastructure projects, they require permits and approval from other governmental agencies. Projects can become delayed awaiting these approvals. However, the County works closely with each project to ensure progress is being made.

The Williamson County CDBG program did not meet its timeliness ratio in July 2011. The County provided HUD Headquarters a response as to the reasons for the delay. After review of the documentation provided, HUD allowed the County to continue with the 2011 allocation of CDBG funding without reduction.

3e. The needs identified in the FY09-13 Consolidated Plan were improvement of infrastructure followed by providing affordable housing. The projects funded and active during this reporting period have provided flood relief, affordable housing, and are in the process of providing functional sewage and wastewater services.

3f. The Georgetown Old Mill Project has provided sidewalks and drainage for the Habitat community of Old Mill located in Georgetown. There are currently twenty Habitat homes completed in the area assisting 80 residents. There have been 75 wastewater connections made in Jarrell and 67 connections made in Liberty Hill.

3g. As the Williamson County CDBG program continues to expand its projects, the program has experienced some obstacles. Delay in project start up and thus completion has a negative impact on the overall project. Delays are typically due to delays in permits or other approvals from governmental agencies required prior to continuing a project.

3h. Major goals of the CDBG program are on target for completion.

3i. The County will ensure that projects are ready to begin utilizing funds once they are made available in an effort to avoid any further timeliness issues. Also, when possible, the County will avoid paying upfront costs to projects. This will not only assist with the timeliness but also ensure that CDBG expenditures remain eligible.

Program Year 2 CAPER Housing Needs response:

Habitat Georgetown, now Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County, received FY04 CDBG funds to provide infrastructure for the new residential area of Old Mill Village. All twenty homes have been completed.

Habitat was also awarded \$150,000 for land acquisition. Lots will be purchased throughout the County and Habitat will build affordable houses for income eligible residents. This project is expected to begin within the next 3 to 6 months.

Specific Housing Objectives

Program Year 2 CAPER Specific Housing Objectives response:

Twenty Williamson County Habitat homes have been completed in the Old Mill area of Georgetown assisting 80 residents. Of these, thirteen are identified as very-low income and seven are identified as extremely low income households.

CDBG funding for land acquisition will be utilized to purchase additional lots for affordable housing.

The County supports the Capital Area Finance Corporation which assists low-income individuals and families with first time purchases of homes.

Public Housing Strategy

Program Year 2 CAPER Public Housing Strategy response:

The Grants Coordinator plans to improve the public housing and resident initiatives by attempting to coordinate efforts of the County’s Housing Authorities and public services available to low-income residents. Issues such as population growth, lack of centralized information availability, and lack of available funding are issues that will be addressed.

An Analysis of Impediments is currently underway and will assist in better identifying needs and barriers of housing in Williamson County.

Barriers to Affordable Housing

Program Year 2 CAPER Barriers to Affordable Housing response:

The lack of available affordable housing is a significant barrier in Williamson County. Considerable waiting lists are in place for those who are seeking assistance. The County supports organizations that will assist in alleviating this issue.

Affordability is another barrier that low-income residents face. The County supports numerous organizations in an effort to achieve the objective described as financial assistance. These organizations support low income residents with utilities, rent, food, shelter, as well as health care, counseling and social assistance.

Habitat for Humanity was awarded \$150,000 of CDBG funds to purchase lots throughout the County. Affordable housing will be built on the these lots.

Program Year 2 CAPER Community Development response:

1. Nine projects were funded in FY10, seven infrastructure projects and two social service projects. All projects are identified as a high priority in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan. Projects are in progress and on track to meet the goals originally set. To date, no program objectives have been changed. All funds awarded and utilized by projects are for low income residents of the County.

Habitat for Humanity was awarded FY04 funds for the infrastructure of 20 affordable homes. All twenty homes have been completed. Seven are identified as extremely low income and 13 are identified as very low income.

Seventy-five wastewater connections have been made in Jarrell to income eligible residents and sixty-seven have been made to income eligible residents of Liberty Hill.

All CDBG funds (100%) are obligated to projects that benefit low to moderate income residents.

2. No significant changes have been made. However, the County is considering program income and match policies.

3. All planned actions were pursued over the FY10 program year. Projects that were delayed are continually being monitored to ensure progress.

All projects submit documentation that is consistent with Williamson County CDBG policies which reflect federal regulations and guidelines.

Williamson County uses the Consolidated Plan as a guide in implementing projects that utilize CDBG funding. There was no action or willful inaction to hinder the implementation of the Consolidated Plan.
